Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.

Bethel Lutheran Church Minutes of the Annual Meeting Sunday, January 29, 2023 at 9:45 am

President Bill Hoekstra called the meeting to order at 9:47 am and presented the adjusted agenda for the meeting. Pastor Inger offered an opening prayer.

A motion was made by Pat Stahly and seconded to accept the agenda presented. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Don Pavek, seconded by Knight Stanley to approve the minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting. The motion carried.

Finance Committee Chair, Jared Plotz, presented the financial report. A resolution was presented for allocation of the budget surplus from 2022 as follows:

- -\$7,000 to go to the Refugee Fund for refugee family expenses
- -\$3,300 to go to the Organ Renewal Fund for Phase II of the renovation of the organ
- -\$7,000 to go into Capital Reserves
- -\$3,300 to go into the Good Samaritan Fund

A motion was made by Lois Stratmoen and seconded to adopt the resolution. Following questions and discussion, the motion carried.

Jared Plotz presented the 2023 Proposed Budget.

A motion was made by Marv Farmer, seconded by Michelle Vosejpka to accept the proposed budget. Following discussion of the changes in transportation options for Bethel Youth trips, the motion carried.

President Bill Hoekstra recognized and offered appreciation for the outgoing committee chairs for their tireless work on behalf of Bethel. He thanked the entire council for their excellent work in a challenging year, as well as the congregation for their support in all areas of the mission of the church.

Bill Hoekstra presented the Bethel Lutheran Church 2023 Annual Meeting Ballot which included nominations for the following.

Still, personnel is a significant expense, and I appreciate Personnel and Council's prayerful prudence and the congregation's flexibility as we move forward. I am confident that together the pastors and office manager can meet our communication needs, but it won't be the same as having a communications manager. A big thank you to Janice Lehmkuhl for her work on the *Blaze*, the *Weekly*, and the website.


A big thank you to Phyllis Larson and the Personnel Committee, as well as Ben Fisher and the Call Committee, for all their work behind the scenes.

Key support systems got up and running:

Much thanks to Barb Fowler and the Finance Committee's leadership, and to super volunteers Kelly & Marci Groenewold for lending their time and expertise getting Brooks set up to really work for Bothel, patiently teaching others.

The team is beginning to meld together, and I am enjoying sharing the load. While I knew I would enjoy alternating preaching and presiding responsibilities with an associate, I had not anticipated the relief I would get not preparing announcements every week! More seriously, I am especially excited that Bethel's varied and vibrant ministries are getting more focused pastoral attention. Currently, Pastor Ben is leading Limitless Chapel on Wednesdays and is the primary pastoral advisor for Stewardship, Mission & Justice, Creation Care, RIC, Homes for God's Children, and Kitchen committees. He is also taking the lead on a newly formed AV Update Task Force. I am better able to focus on pastoral care and being the pastoral advisor for Personnel, Finance, Endowment, Congregational Life, Worship & Arts, Funeral committees, the Refugee Welcome team and the Nourishing Vocation Project.

Even as we were doing this important organizational work, 2023 was an exciting year in ministry.

SERVICE. We are just over a year into our sponsorship of a family seeking asylum – a huge undertaking. We are learning so much (about our neighbors, ourselves, our community, our immigration policies and procedures) in this ministry. A special thanks to Jane Runzheimer for her leadership, to the dedicated team, and to all the transportation volunteers who are helping the family connect in Northfield.

We also supported our neighbors through the March Food Drive, the Alleluia 5K, the Garage Sale, summer Habitat builds, the Good Samaritan Fund, the "Hope for the Holidays" cards for immigrants and more.

LEARNING. The Sunday education hour options expanded this fall, with "Bible Deep Dive" (a text study with the preaching pastor) being offered alongside "Bethel Presents" and "faith flow." A Mission & Justice series led to the adoption of Bethel's land acknowledgement; the two part "Minority Representation in the Church" opened



our eyes to the growing edges of authentic welcome. Thanks to all our presenters, and to Barb Farmer and team for their careful work encouraging us in life-long faith formation.

COMMUNITY. In the summer, we started the **Nourishing Vocation Project (NVP)** – a St. Olaf / Lilly Endowment supported program to help us connect to God and to one another, that we might act with a greater sense of purpose both in our individual lives and as a congregation. NVP material is woven through different aspects of our life together – education, fellowship, and worship this year. Thank you to Cindy Kreis, Barb Farmer, Juley Jenkinson, Marci Groenewald, and Megan Engel for helping sift through and tailor the resources.

In the first phase – "Getting to Know You" we focused on connection. I heard from visitors (who became new members!) that the quick but authentic conversations helped them connect on a deeper level, or, changed college students' impressions of what Christians talked about. We also have a lot to say – and that gets noisy! Hearing was sometimes difficult. Other members struggled for other reasons. Whether you experienced those moments as joy or challenge, thank you for experimenting with us. Thinking about values, openness and call, attention, regret, and experiences of the holy as individuals set us up for thinking about "Who We Are Together" – the second phase of the project, begun on Reformation Sunday.

In the November congregational workshop, ten groups brainstormed the values they identified with Bethel, and shared how they understood the congregation living them out. I was especially delighted by how the inclusion we claim in our welcome statement was embodied: a new, youthful staff member joined the conversation at my table, and another table worked bilingually. Among all the groups, some words consistently surfaced, but could also have different layers. For instance, community for some meant fellowship within the congregation and the bonds formed in small groups and outings. For others, community included neighbors beyond the congregation, and our mission and justice efforts. While there are different nuances, worship and community emerged as central to who we are at Bethel.

WORSHIP. I am treasuring your awareness of the centrality of worship in our lives together. It is in how you lift up your voices or engage a sermon. It is in the talent you share in worship – the musical gifts and rehearsals. It is in the silence you held in Holden Evening Prayer this Advent – and the record attendance of those services. And I have noticed that many of you are even joining me in wearing the colors of the liturgical seasons – something that can be both light-hearted and a way of orienting to God's time and activity. Because of course, worship ultimately includes our lives outside the sanctuary.

During Advent, we asked what God might be asking us to be open to, what God might be calling us from, or to. With key staff positions filled, "openness" feels more possible. Ideas that had been on hold are getting attention and energy. For instance, Brenda (with support from Pastor Ben) is piloting a "Children's Church" option during the second service. Our partnerships with the other Northfield ELCA congregations can deepen – building on our Joint Thanksgiving service and JTerm efforts, in 2024 we're having a joint summer camp at Good Earth Village, and there's even a plan for coordinated summer trip for all ages to Holden Village in early August. There will be more "Sing Boldly!" events at the Contented Cow.

Finally, my deep gratitude to leaders whose particular tasks are ending. Ben Fisher stalwartly chaired the call committee (again!) and I trust his expertise in teambuilding and insights into myself and Pastor Ben as individual leaders. Chris Bussmann's wisdom and problem solving will be very missed on council (but we get to enjoy his culinary genius and work ethic leading Bistro through the school year!). As chair of Personnel, Phyllis Larson has navigated myriad challenges with firmness and grace, and has been shoulder and sounding board for me.

2023 has been another wonderfully delightful year in the Nursery! We work hard to foster an environment that is loving, inclusive, spirit-filled, and fun all while sharing Christ's LOVE with a big heart.

- We have seen an uptick in Sunday and Wednesday attendance in the nursery. It has been a joy to have a room full of happy and energetic kids again.
- The Nursery hosted Parents' Night Out in March with 25 kids in attendance and a Parents' Morning Out in December with 33 kids in attendance. This has always been an event that the Nursery staff greatly looks forward to. We were thrilled to be able to offer these fun events again.
- Our weekly Sunday FUN-Day themes continue to be a hit amongst the the children and staff in the Nursery. We want kids to look forward to coming to church and spending time in the Nursery so these themes (i.e. Messy Play Day, Camp Jesus, Recycling is RAD, etc.) make Sundays feel extra FUN!
- Introduced Spanish versions of Bible stories and music to our regular programming.
- Creating a large canvas mural as a group art project.



<u>Director of Children's Ministries — Brenda Atzinger</u>

Well friends, we have managed an entire calendar year of 3D ministry. Yay us! It is so good to see your faces, to high five, fist bump and hug in the hallways. We saw tremendous growth in participation over the course of 2022 and we have maintained that steady participation tin2023 as well.

We have welcomed new leadership and energy into Children's Ministry with Pastor Ben's presence. His visions have aligned beautifully with Bethel's values for children, and it has been a joy to create and renovate together. Limitless Chapel has a camp worship feel now and the kids have engaged at a whole new level in this style of worship. Camp is near and dear to Pastor Ben's heart in general. We sensed a summer camp change was needed, so a new partnership has been born with Good Earth Village in collaboration with our sister congregations to claim a "Northfield Week". Our last co-visioned project is now underway with Children's Church during the late service. This is a new option for elementary-aged children to attend part of worship with their family, then leave for a child-centered worship and activity time before rejoining the congregation. For those families who struggle to attend both Sunday School and worship, or those whose kids may simply appreciate an alternative, we hope this provides value to our families. We will learn soon whether this fills an ongoing need for Bethel.

We continue to provide special Sunday School parent-child events for Grades 1-3, and Retreats for Grades 3-5 covering Baptism, Worship, and Holy Communion. Family Sunday School Events have also continued with sledding in the winter, our Easter Egg and Story Event on Palm Sunday, and a Spring Grand Finale at the Arboretum. This year we added a park playdate over MEA weekend.

Despite frustrating air quality issues, we managed to hold our Family Vacation Bible School as a joint effort with St. John's, St. Peter's and Emmaus once again. Weather and air conditions affected attendance, but it was greatly enjoyed by those present.

During Limitless we created Easter, Valentine's Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas décor for our friends at the Northfield Retirement Center. We also shared Christmas cheer with a caroling field trip to the NRC in December. We are intentional about serving others.

Speaking of Christmas, we had approximately 60 children participating once again from the combined Sunday School and Limitless ministries in our double cast Christmas Program. It is great fun and meaningful chaos to share this timeless story with the children and congregation in fresh ways.

Thank you for sharing your children with us. Thank you for financially supporting children's ministry. Thank you for volunteering and praying. We are intentionally raising incredible adults. As always, we're in this together.



Director of Youth Ministries — Kristi Larson

Last summer the Children Youth and Family (CYF) staff had some big conversations. Who are we and where do we want to put our attention and resources? What are a few values we want to focus on to help the young people in our community grow? What is already woven into the fabric of who Bethel is as a faith community?

We came up with five core commitments: Faith. Inclusion. Relationships. Generosity. Worship. Here are a few of the ways Bethel Youth have grown in these 5 commitments in the year 2023.

At Bethel Lutheran we aspire to grow in...

Faith – Before last summer I had never been to Flathead Lutheran Bible camp but the thing I heard repeatedly was how much everyone who attends grows in their faith. And this trip did not disappoint! Not only did the 28 kids who attended talk about how they grew to understand Christ more, but their stories, the beautiful landscape and all the laughter allowed the 5 of us adults to spend time basking in the spirit as well.

Inclusion – If you walk by the youth room between 7:00 and 8:00 on a Wednesday evening you will see 20-30 high school kids playing games, sharing highs and lows, and laughing. But you might not recognize everyone in the room. That's because several of them are not from families that attend Bethel. Rather, they are friends the kids have invited who feel comfortable enough to join us each week. Because at hangtime (and at Bethel) all are welcome.

Relationships – Up the mountain the 11 soon-to-be-confirmed 10th graders (and two adults and two counselors) went with their bags filled with gear and their eyes filled with apprehension. That's how they left for Christikon Lutheran Bible Camp. Five days later the same people returned sunburnt, bug-bitten and in desperate need of a shower but very changed. They were more respectful of one another, kinder and better listeners. Perhaps relying on others means that friendship becomes something deeper. Whatever it was, relationships were formed on that mountain.

Generosity – In 2023, the theme of the March Food Drive was "Frozen" with Elsa, her friends and even the three bears. But around all that silliness something amazing happened. Over \$18,000 was raised to support hungry families in our community! But equally as important is that our kids got to not only witness all of that generosity, they got to be the leaders! Thanks be to God!

Worship – On the last Sunday of each month our kids get to help lead worship by reading, ushering and serving communion. Those who participate gain a greater understanding and respect for how and why we worship while being leaders themselves.

Looking forward:

In 2024 we want to keep these commitments at the front and center of our ministry. And that's where you come in. The staff can't do this alone, even with the most wonderful volunteers and devout parents. Instead, we need kids to see you as a community place stock in these commitments. Don't tell them, show them. It will impact them much more than you think.

Thank you for your continued support this year. Not only do you generously give of your time and resources, but you care so deeply about the wonderful kids we have at Bethel. Thank you for continuing to encourage, pray for and love these beloved children of God.

As we finish 2023, we find that our expenses have continued to rise. The utility costs have increased over 15% to 20% this past year and the property insurance has increased by 20%. We were also advised that property insurance companies have changed how they insure for roof repair, resulting in a separate roof repair deductible of \$75,000.

The following projects were completed this year:

- Phase II of the Organ Upgrade was completed, which included general upgrades, electrical and new controller upgrades. Phase I was paid from the Capital Reserve fund and Phase II was covered by member donations.
- The outdoor stage was rebuilt to be a permanent structure.
- Heat elements in a couple of our rooftop units were replaced.
- A new sidewalk was built from the patio to the stage, and we replaced some broken sidewalk on the west side.
- The handbells and chimes were completely refurbished for the first time in 21 years. LED lighting was finalized in the center and east pods to finish a multi-year project. The entire church building now has LED lighting.

Special thanks to volunteers who are always available when we need help. All of them have special talents: carpenters, plumbers, electricians, and painters, so we are able to handle a lot of the projects in-house which saves Bethel a considerable amount of money. And a special thank you goes to Alice and Merle Burmeister for their continuous work on our grounds.

As Bethel continues to grow, it is important to remember that any projects or improvements to our church building need to have approval from staff, Church Council or Finance Committee.

Congregational President — Bill Hoekstra

Blessings and peace to you!

First Peter 4:10-11 says, "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord." For me, these verses are a call to challenge and urge us to glorify God on earth, by selflessly using our talents and abilities in whatever form we can embody. Each day of the week, Bethel members selflessly demonstrate their gifts. I know our community feels the benefits. This past year has been no exception.

During 2023, Bethel members continued their long history of helping to create change for the better. We began reconditioning our organ, a much overdue task that meaningfully and powerfully contributes to enhancing our worship. Further, our musical ministry remains a powerful accentuation within our worship. Our church welcomed a new associate pastor, Pastor Ben Schori, to complete our ministry staff. This allows us full and effective pastoral leadership within our church. Pastor Phil Ruud continued supporting ministerial outreach, growing a deeply needed service to our congregation. With the addition of Pastor Ben and the work of Pastor Phil, leadership and management of the church is now finally balanced for Pastor Inger Hanson. Bethel U continued to inspire and challenge us to more fully live into our faith, and our children's and youth ministry kept very active. Additionally, ministry and small group leaders came together for the second year of Bethel's Leadership Summit to share and create ideas.

God calls us to love all people with open arms. Bethel is committed to this path as shown through several initiatives this last year aimed at inclusion and love for the whole community. Adopting a Statement for the Prevention of Interpersonal Harm for groups within Bethel as well as a Land Use Acknowledgment stand out as powerful examples. Well attended Bistro dinners; support for the challenges facing Viking Terrace community; a trip to the Southern US border; generous giving to the community and the CAC; sponsorship of a family in need of asylum; support for Habitat for Humanity; presence at Pride in the Park; worshiping with other local Lutheran churches during Thanksgiving and the Bethel Fun Run; and our growing congregation attendance serve as just a few of the many examples of this commitment. While our congregation does not act to seek recognition, Bethel was a grateful recipient of the Servant of Christ award from Lutheran Social Services signifying the community's awareness of our church's work.

For the first time, Bethel carries an operating deficit into the new year. This represents a growing need for our church to be mindful, flexible, and adaptive. With spirit-led giving, a portion of the deficit was generously covered by year's end. Additionally, the church council is exploring ways to engage our evolving congregation, manage church budgetary needs, and foster growth for our faith development. This exciting prospect is leading us to new and creative thinking. For example, we are becoming increasingly energy efficient and environmentally aware as a church; we are finding ways to be more efficient within our administration; we are striving to be more inclusive of diversity to reflect our increasingly diverse community; and we are working to make church giving far more accessible and user friendly. Further, 2023 blessed us with a large endowment gift allowing us to think creatively and generously into the foreseeable future without requiring use of our operating budget.

Our church is humming and bursting with joy and energy! I challenge you to choose a Sunday or Bistro night, take a deep breath, close your eyes, and connect to the energy of God's hand resonating throughout our church. It's in the music, the Sunday school classrooms, Bethel U, small group ministry, Bistro meals, and worship. THANK YOU for everything you do for Bethel; you *are* the hands and feet of Jesus! Praise be to God!

Finance Committee — Barb Fowler

It was a challenging year for Bethel's finances with much communication and discussion surrounding the operating fund deficit. In October 31, the deficit had climbed to \$79K. Thankfully, Bethel members increased their giving and by year-end, the deficit was reduced to \$17,008. Years of annual surpluses, set aside in the operating reserve account, will be used to cover this shortfall.

Revenue and Expenses ...

Offerings and other revenues totaled \$931,275. This was 3.5% increase over last year but less than actual expenses of \$948,283 by \$17,008.

- ** On-line giving represented 44% of total offerings.
- ** Interest and dividend income totaled \$20,855 due to investing our available cash in US Treasury bills thereby earning 4.5 to 5% interest. This level of income will likely not be sustained in the long term so this is not an income source we should count on.

Expenses totaled \$948,283 which was a 5.4% increase over last year but only \$1337 below the 2023 budget of \$949,620.

- ** Personnel and Administration expenses totaled \$695,420 which represented 73% of total expenses. The increase over last year was led by adding staff, higher benefits and a full year of the contract for financial services with Lighthouse Strategic Solutions.
- ** Facilities expenses of \$115,161 represented 12% of total expenses. The increase was due to higher than normal utility costs, record-setting snow and insurance expenses.
- ** Benevolences paid from the operating budget totaled \$68,422 and those paid from dedicated non-budgeted donations totaled \$115,459 for a grand total of \$183,881. This is 20% of total offerings.

Capital projects

- ** \$45,500 was spent on capital projects from the Capital Reserve Fund. Projects included: purchasing AV equipment in the sanctuary and AV room, having the bells and chimes professionally refurbished, and upgrading the outdoor stage and associated concrete work.
- ** Phase II of the organ renovation project was completed. The cost of \$32,500 was paid from donations to the dedicated organ fund. The balance in this fund is \$12,987.

Endowment Fund ...

The Bethel Endowment Fund balance as of November 30, was \$505,626. Bethel was the beneficiary of a large estate gift, which is invested with other Bethel Endowment funds in the ELCA Endowment Fund Pooled Trust. This fund will produce annual payouts of about 4% of market value, enabling the Endowment Committee to begin making annual awards for projects not part of the operating budget.

Blackbaud, our former financial provider, agreed to sever the 5-year contract resulting in a savings of \$20,000.

We have submitted our application for the Employee Retention Credit from the IRS. The credit could be \$107,000; however, it may be several months before we receive the funds.

Two Bethel members completed the 2022 audit of procedures and no material weaknesses or discrepancies were found.

At the Budget Meeting, the 2024 Budget will be presented. Each year, the Finance Committee and the Church Council set the budget, based on discussions with the Personnel committee and other budget managers, at a level they view as needed to run the church. Please come to hear the detail of this important commitment.

It is a privilege to oversee the funds that you so generously give to support the work of Bethel and to donate to many other causes. Visitors are welcome at our meetings on the second Thursday of each month. 2023 was an exciting year for the Bethel Endowment in many ways:

We awarded our first grant in early 2023. Jessica Labenski received an award of \$900 to be used for her Candidacy Fee to the Southeast Minnesota Synod, as she began her faith journey to become an ELCA minster.

The Endowment received a gift of \$440,000 from the Estate of Donald Nelson in late summer, and we added these funds to the Bethel Endowment Fund account being managed by the ELCA. This generous gift will allow us to make countless meaningful grants in the future.

The balance of the Endowment Fund being held in our account at the ELCA on December 31, 2022, was \$37,495.26. The balance of the Fund on November 30, 2023, was \$501,381.83.

The Endowment Committee is currently in the process of reviewing applications for grants to be issued in January 2024. We received 11 grant applications, which was a substantial increase from last year. We are planning to distribute \$10,000, with final decisions to be made before year end.

In prior years, our goals focused on providing education to the congregation about the Endowment Fund, growing the Fund balance and making an initial distribution. In 2024, we will continue providing education about the Fund and its long-term benefits, and we hope to continue growing the Fund. In addition, we also now have the benefit of being able to make considerable gifts from the Fund that will make a difference in our congregation and outside the walls of Bethel.

This was a year of transition for the Stewardship Committee as long-time member and chair Gordy Olson stepped away. We continue to be grateful for Gordy's leadership in this endeavor over the years and continue to benefit from his knowledge, expertise and kindness.

We have had many rich conversations about the financial direction of Bethel and what role the Stewardship Committee can and should play. Historically, Stewardship has been about finding ways to maintain and increase congregational giving. The current committee, however, sees its mission as being about much more than raising money. Rather, stewardship is really about helping to ensure that the church is a vibrant community full of life and energy in praise of our God.

To that end, the committee focused on the following key initiatives this year:

Breeze – With the tremendous work of Kelly & Marci Groenewold, the new church information management system has gotten off the ground. Thank you, Kelly and Marci! Our committee worked to establish in-church opportunities for congregation members to get their profiles created in Breeze so that our church staff can better communicate with and organize congregants to better and more completely serve the needs of the church. If you somehow missed the memo, please get the information you need to get activated in Breeze. Otherwise you'll miss out on important church information!

Time & Talent – In order to know how people can and are willing to serve, we need to know the time and talent you have to offer Bethel! This important worksheet is still stuck in the paper era, but our committee is working to move it not only into the digital realm, but also into Breeze! Our hope is that we can then better know and sort the time and talents this incredible congregation has!

Budget Gap Closure – As the year progressed, it became clear that Bethel was dealing with a significant budget gap. Stewardship was enlisted to provide written updates and pleas, and temple talks aimed at both educating the congregation members and asking them to prayerfully consider their giving in an effort to close the gap. As of this writing, we are cautiously optimistic that we can make our budget by year's end.

Giving Evolution – As we head into 2024, we will be harvesting data from the church to look at giving trends in an effort to see if we can maximize online giving, educate congregants more thoroughly about the economic needs of the church, and work toward a more evenly distributed pattern of giving across the months. Currently, giving patterns make for some stressful budget questions among our staff. We hope to help the congregation move in a direction that allows staff to focus on less on budget concerns and more on the life and work of the church.

There were staff changes this year, too:

- Kristi Larson became our full-time Director of Youth Ministry

She put her own stamp on our publications and communications, and worked hard to provide an attractive guide to happenings at our busy church. The congregation will miss her work, but the staff will miss her even more because of her warmth, kindness and compassion.


<u>Projects and activities of the Worship and Arts Committee for 2023:</u> We are pleased to share our efforts over the past year. They include:


--The committee worked with Megan Engel and Pastor Inger to institute a "Worship and Arts Feedback" meeting. These meetings link the interests, gifts and ideas of the congregation with those of the worship staff, believing that doing so will find creative ways to enliven the connection between worship and arts. The first meeting was held in August and focused on Advent, with a meeting about Post-Pentecost worship held in November. Our focus continues to be on education advocacy and support for a variety of organizations as well as encouragement of financial giving beyond the budget.

We annually determine where to distribute Mission & Justice benevolence funds for local, regional and international needs. We also decide with the Stewardship Committee on the recipients for the Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter special offering appeals.

We support and often work collaboratively with Bethel's Homes for God's Children, Alternative Giving Fair, and ARLA (Anti-Racism Learning & Advocacy). In the community we help supply volunteers at the NCEC (Northfield Community Education Center) the satellite food shelf of CAC (Community Action Center). We encourage involvement with Habitat for Humanity and advocate for Viking Terrace. Food and housing security are fundamental rights for all.

In December of 2022, we welcomed an asylum-seeking family from Peru. A Welcome Team of volunteers continues to coordinate the care for their needs at this time of waiting and keeps Bethel members informed. We have come to know this family and appreciate their lives with us at Bethel.



Eleven members from Bethel went to the southern border early this year under the auspices of the SE Lutheran Synod and Border Servant Corps in Las Cruces, NM, to be immersed in learning more about immigration issues. The impact of the experience was shared during a Bethel Presents session in March. It is our hope that more individuals will take the opportunity to go on such a trip when it is offered again.

A primary focus has been the continuation of education about the history and issues related to Native Americans. We have hosted films, two Indigenous speakers, and provided resources. In the summer of 2022, a committee subgroup, including Connie Degrote of ARLA, began working toward a Bethel Land Acknowledgement Statement. A final draft was accepted by the Church Council in March 2023. This fall the congregation was given opportunity to comment on it and a survey was available in October. Over 90 percent was approval given and the council gave final approval to this at their November 2023 meeting. In December the whole committee, along with Karna Hauck of the Worship & Arts committee, met with a Christian Native American artist with whom we have interest for commissioning a work of art to visually represent our Land Acknowledgement Statement. Seed money for this commission has already been started.

During the summer, monthly Wednesday evening films were offered. One related to the immigration of people between Maltrata, Mexico and Northfield while the second was on Habitat for Humanity. The discussion following both of these films was valuable. The final movie was an animated family film with movie snacks.

A topic which has drawn a lot of interest is that of concern for eldercare. An informative panel discussion in October especially brought to light the needs of our elders, their families, employees, and employers her in Northfield, and also explained the legislation that's needed. We commit to continued advocacy on this topic.

Homes for God's Children — Gordy Olson

Homes for God's Children began with an effort in 2022, through the Hillcrest project, to first focus on those who were homeless or who needed emergency housing. Bethel responded with \$77,000 and we can be proud of that achievement.

In 2023, the project moved up one level to Habitat for Humanity with the aim to concentrate on those who would qualify as working poor and who struggle to get on the upward economic conveyor belt through owning their own home.

In contrast to the Hillcrest project, which was a one-time event, Habitat for Humanity is an ongoing community effort and the goals for the year were different:

1. Provide information on housing in Rice County through articles in the *Blaze*, Bethel U and cottage meetings.

2. Focus more on increasing volunteer support for the construction of Habitat homes as opposed to raising money in the hope that the volunteer commitment will carry over into future years.

3. More limited fund raising with the emphasis on increasing the number of Bethel members supporting Habitat for Humanity with donations on a yearly basis.

The results again show the willingness of the members of Bethel to act:

Adult Education

In February, Creation Care organized a 4-week Bethel U course called "Seeing the Sacred in Nature." In her book *Sacred Nature*, author Karen Armstrong says, "We need to recover the veneration of nature that human beings cultivated for millennia." The sessions were as follows:

February 5 – Is Our Soil Healthy?

From storing carbon to preventing soil erosion, healthy soils are the key to help improving our environment and local water quality. Presented by Teresa Demars, Public Relations and Information Specialist, Soil and Water Conservation District, Rice County.

February 12 – The Prairie as Garden

Prairie landscapes covered much of Minnesota up until the late 19th century. This rich, inspiring history has much to teach us. Presented by Dr. Charles Umbanhowar, Professor of Biology and Environmental Studies at St. Olaf, Director of the Natural Lands.

February 19 – Is It Okay to Love a Tree?

While much stands in the way of American Christians embracing the idea of sacred nature, trees lure us in that direction. Presented by Rev. Bruce Benson, retired St. Olaf College Pastor.

February 26 - Birds and the Web of Life

Explore the amazing and varied world of birds through the eyes of Dr. Gerry Hoekstra, St. Olaf Professor of Music emeritus, accomplished birder and wildlife photographer, and frequent exhibitor in the Bethel art gallery.

Youth Events

In the spring, members of the committee led sessions with Bethel youth as follows:

9th Grade Confirmation

March 15 – A committee member led a session called "Contemplating Climate Change." Students were asked about their own level of concern and to estimate the concern of others. We explored what the Bible tells us about caring for creation and talked about what that could mean for us now.

Limitless – 4th and 5th Graders

April 20 – Committee members took students on a tour of Bethel's environmental projects. Afterwards, students drew pictures of some of those projects and some creation-care-related things they do at home or at school.

May 3 – Members and Kevin Strauss of the Clean River Partnership walked around the neighborhood cleaning and marking storm drains and handing out fliers about what not to dump in the drains.

May 10 – Members walked with the children to the St. Olaf Natural Lands for a tour with naturalists.

Season of Creation

Continuing a new practice from 2022, August was designated the "Season of Creation." At the beginning of each service, a committee member spoke about the theme of the day and invited the congregation to visit the Among the Ministries table, which tied into the theme as follows.

August 6 – Forest

Featured information on reducing palm oil use, using recycled paper products and planting trees in the Chippewa National Forest through the Arbor Day Foundation

August 13 - Land

Todd Lippert shared information about the Land Stewardship Project

August 20 - Wilderness

Displayed a map of local and state-wide wilderness areas with pins for members to mark where they've been

August 27 - Rivers

Shared information on an upcoming CRP clean-up, the city's Adopt A Catch Basin program and pictures of the 4th graders cleaning storm drains

Renewable Energy

At the Committee's recommendation, Bethel asked Xcel to switch the remainder of our non-solar panel electricity to Windsource. This means that 100% of our electricity comes from renewable sources.

Adopt-A-Highway

In May and October, Creation Care gathered a group of volunteers to clean up Bethel's stretch of Highway 3.

Composting

The Committee continued working with the Kitchen Committee members and staff to maintain our composting efforts and improve them as needed.

Bethel Endowment Fund Grant Proposal

Palm Sunday Pancake Breakfast – Rebirth of a previous tradition was carried out in a spring setting in the CLC with a special pancake and yogurt breakfast that allowed the congregation to relax and share in community a week before the most holy week of the year. Many volunteers gathered to plan this special event, which also included palm branches, dyed eggs and spring tulips in order to help celebrate the coming of our Lord. Perhaps we'll see donkeys in 2024!

Habitat for Humanity Day – Bethel was in the second year of "Homes for God's Children" with the focus on Habitat for Humanity. Therefore, our committee members participated and provided opportunities for others to join them on a Saturday in July as 12 Bethelites sheetrocked, sanded and painted homes in Faribault. Our committee is planning to hold additional Bethel volunteer build days in the coming year as Northfield sites begin to need our help. We're planning to again, offer free daycare at Bethel for young families while parents volunteer. Kids could be making forts for fun, and adults could be building homes for the community! Look for this special opportunity coming in 2024!

Creation Care Bike, Walk or Carpool to Worship – For the second year, our committee worked in coordination with the Creation Care and Worship planning to promote a "Season of Creation" liturgical pattern which focused on the care and celebration of God's creation. To help provide action among our congregation, our committee encouraged everyone to bike, walk or carpool to church each Sunday during this awareness month of August. Participants were entered into a raffle for gifts which reflected sustainability gifts from Thrivent seed money and donations by Downtown Bicycles. All children who participated were rewarded with ice cream tokens donated by Culver's or The Blast as a way to motivate them to encourage their parents to continue each week!

Welcome Pastor Ben Schori and family – In August, the Christian Life Center was filled with Bethel members coming together to welcoming Pastor Ben, his wife Melissa and two young daughters, Johanna and Isla, in the traditional Lutheran way. A Congregation BBQ Potluck was planned with help from the Kitchen committee. Sloppy Joes and potato salad were prepared by volunteers in the Bethel kitchen while veggie/fruit/cheese trays, chips and desserts were brought potluck style by the congregation.

Rally Sunday Breakfast – The fall season was welcomed with a warming breakfast in the Christian Life Center for all Bethelites to share in fellowship together. Everyone built their own oatmeal and/or yogurt bowls between services, while connecting with one another and anticipating the return of Sunday School and other educational faith opportunities to come.

ACTSS - Adults Coming Together for Soup and Socializing – This socializing event brought together new and seasoned Bethelites to gather for a simple soup supper in one of their homes three times a year in order to share stories and build community with one another. Five dinner groups were formed with groups of 4-10 people, including couples and individuals. This opportunity for getting to know one another better while sharing a simple dinner will come around again each September. Please consider joining in the new year!

Lizbeth Bakes a Cake Walk! – Our committee partnered with the Refugee Welcoming team to hold an intergenerational Cake Walk during a Bistro evening in November. Lizbeth Ramirez has been serving at Bistro each week and loves to make cakes. This activity spotlighted her talents as she provided four beautifully decorated cakes, 2 pies and 80 cupcakes to be used for this "fun"draiser! It was an exciting evening with over 100 participants. Proceeds supported Bethel's Refugee Fund and the Ramirez family.

Dear Friends,

We are grateful to all of you for your support and involvement with NRC. As of this writing, we're filling Christmas stockings with the gifts from so many of you to our residents. How fortunate we are!

We knew at this time last year that 2023 would be a transitional year for NRC, as indeed it has been. In this report, we share the major highlights of the year for our organization. But allow us first to mention the most important transition of all:

Our residents have moved from the isolation of the COVID years to once again freely and joyfully sharing in fellowship and in fun and interesting activities that brighten and lift spirits. To see people enjoying meals and activities together, worshiping and attending concerts in our chapel, participating in Bible study and hymn sings, spending time with family, sharing laughter and stories with children from local schools who come to visit, warms our hearts and brings smiles to our faces each day.

The return of shared experiences and life in this community means that we are living our mission:

Rooted in Christian values, supporting independence, dignity, and quality of life for the aging by providing innovative living options and services.

Innovative Living Options and Services

As we reported in the *NRC Outlook* in June and September, dealing with issues of staffing, funding, and finances occupied a great deal of 2023. As the Board of Directors analyzed our situation, it became increasingly apparent that the best decision for current and future residents and for the future of NRC was to delicense our Care Center (skilled nursing facility) and to transition the entire campus to assisted living. This significant change in operations went very smoothly thanks to excellent teamwork among staff and to the gracious reception of the changes by residents and family members alike. Fortunately, we were able to move all but two individuals to a new unit on campus and to find appropriate new homes for the individuals leaving NRC. All affected staff chose to remain at NRC.

Innovative Living Options and Services (continued)

NRC now offers a continuum of assisted living and services to residents: Parkview East and West are traditional assisted living apartments; Cannon Valley Suites-MC provides secure memory care and Cannon Valley Suites-EC provides enhanced care for residents in need of a higher level of care than that offered in traditional assisted living with onsite nurses approximately 16 hours/day. Evergreen Lodge remains a dedicated memory care residence. The Manor and Northwood Pines offer an independent option.

We were very pleased to welcome 48 new residents to NRC this year, and we are continuing to expand our outreach efforts to reach full occupancy in what we hope will be the near future. We are also planning to create a new unit in place of the Care Center and are currently determining how best to configure and staff it to meet the growing needs of the community.

Expanded Outreach: Church and Community Relations Committee

As was the case for the majority of organizations during COVID, NRC spent three years focusing inwardmaintaining and adjusting our operations to serve our residents to the best of our ability. The time has now come when we can renew our long-standing partnerships with you, our member congregations, and other organizations in the broader community. The Church and Community Relations Committee of the Board is now back in full swing with monthly meetings. The primary goal of the committee is to ensure that, just as you assist us with financial contributions and volunteer projects, we provide you with ongoing communication and with a range of programs of interest to you, such as educational presentations concerning eldercare issues. In addition, in 2024 we would be glad to attend your annual meetings, just as you attend ours! To that end, we will contact you in the near future to determine whether you would like an NRC representative to join you. And of course, NRC welcomes your suggestions and ideas about how we can best serve you and the elders in your congregation.

Staffing and Financial Stability

NRC received the Northfield News 2023 Readers' Choice for Best Senior Living/Retirement setting, We credit this honor to our committed staff in all departments. As one resident commented, "We are so fortunate to have such a talented and friendly staff. They are so willing to help in many ways, as well as bending an ear to listen to our concerns. They make living here a pleasure!"

Since January, 62 new employees have joined NRC. Twenty of them have received training at NRC and have become certified nursing assistants. We are always recruiting new talent and offer a market-based competitive compensation and benefits package.

Our financial situation continues to improve as we make strides in occupancy and continue to manage our expenses effectively.

Your Contributions to NRC

Again, thank you for your involvement with NRC— for your many volunteer contributions and for your financial support which helps to strengthen our Spiritual Care department and employee and resident assistance funds. We look forward to our collaboration in 2024 and to welcoming you to our annual meeting in April.

Southeastern Minnesota Synod ELCA 2023 Ministry Report

As another year has drawn to a close, we give thanks for what has been and look forward with anticipation and hope.

In 2023, the ministry of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod continued in earnest. Sixty-two congregations engaged in the call process even as some continue their call process into the new year. We were delighted to welcome 21 new rostered ministers into various settings within the synod.

For the first time in several years, we hosted a visit from a global companion synod. Bishop Atahualpa Hernandez of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO) spent a week visiting our synod's leaders, members, and ministries. It was a joy to spend time with him and learn from IELCO's excellent diaconal ministry among the most vulnerable in Colombia.

Our 2023 Synod Assembly, held in May, welcomed Dr. Susan Brower as the keynote speaker. Dr. Brower helped us understand demographic trends across the state and our communities. In May of 2024, we will use this information as a springboard for the focus of our next Synod Assembly. We will welcome Dr. Matt Bloom to share as we consider how each of us can impact our congregations and communities.

As I consider the ministry of the synod in 2024, I am drawn to the phrase *every congregation connected*. In 2023, congregations took advantage of the connections we have with each other; this was especially evident in the continued increase of collaborations between individual congregations. Throughout the synod, congregations have strengthened ministry through partnering with neighboring congregations.

As we draw on the strength of our internal connections, we have an opportunity to engage afresh with the communities our congregations are already a part of. What opportunities are there to be the church for the community beyond our buildings? What is already happening that we can come alongside? What needs of our neighbors currently need to be met?

One of the gifts of being a congregation of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod is that no congregation must go it alone. We are part of a network with congregations and connections that strengthen us and multiply the impact we have in the communities to which we are called.

May the Spirit open our hearts and minds to all the ways God continues to invite us to participate in God's good work in the world!
